## GenEd Requirements, Electives, and College Requirements

In addition to the major requirements listed below, you will need to fill the following General Education (GenEd) categories:

- I00-level Wellness \& Physical (l cr) • Literature (3 cr) • Spiritual and Ethical (3 cr) • Themed Explorations (9 cr)
- 200-level Wellness \& Physical (I cr) - Quantitative Reasoning (3 cr)
- Aesthetic Expression (3 cr)
- 300-level Wellness \& Physical ( 1 cr ) - Scientific Reasoning (4 cr)

These majors typically require 85 credits to complete, totaling 125 credits with GenEds and 3 credits of electives.

- The residency requirement- 45 credits taken at Springfield College (including 15 of your last 30 )

## HIST \& EDUC/SED Major Requirements - Typical Fourth-Year Schedule

## Fall or Spring:

Select a minimum of $\mathbf{1 2}$ credits (in consultation with your advisor) from:
EDUC 464, Middle School Practicum and Seminar (4-I2 cr)
EDUC 465, High School Practicum and Seminar (4-I2 cr)
Plus any outstanding major requirements, GenEds, or electives to total a minimum of 120 credits for your career

## Additional HIST \& EDUC/SED Major Requirements - Flexible Timing

When combining HIST with EDUC/SED, you must complete the courses and selective categories listed below. (In general, 200-level courses can be taken first year or later, and 300-level can be taken second year or later. As courses may not be offered every year, 400-level courses should be taken third year if offered.)

- A minimum cumulative GPA of 2.750 for all designated licensure courses (see Educator Preparation Handbook for more information)
- Earn a minimum cumulative GPA of 2.500
- Receive a passing score on the Communication and Literacy Skills Test (reading and writing) of the Massachusetts Test for Education Licensure (MTEL)
- Receive passing scores on the appropriate MTEL Subject Tests
