If you entered Springfield College in 2018-2019, use this guide for sequencing your courses. Requirements are subject to change and may not be offered when listed. Use your online degree audit to verify your progress, and always confirm your plans with your advisor.

GenEd Requirements, Electives, and College Requirements

In addition to the major requirements listed below, you will need to fill the following General Education (GenEd) categories:

These majors typically require 95 to 99 credits to complete (totaling as many as 126 to 130 credits with additional GenEds). You will not need any electives to total the College requirement of 120. In addition to the GenEd and major requirements listed, you must complete:

- **The residency requirement**—60 credits taken at Springfield College (including 15 of your last 30)

ENGL 113, College Writing I (3 cr – also fills half College Writing GenEd)
 ARTS 108, Studio in Drawing (3 cr – also fills Visual/Performing Arts GenEd)
 ARTS 111, Studio in Design (3 cr)
 Plus major requirements with flexible timing to total approximately 15 credits (recommended to delay free choice GenEds to 3rd or 4th year)

Spring:

ENGL 114, College Writing II (3 cr – also fills half College Writing GenEd)
 ARTS 104, Creativity: Methods and Practices (3 cr)
 ARTS 116, Studio in Painting (3 cr)
 EDUC 237, Foundations of Multicultural Education (3 cr – also fills the Multicultural component of International/Multicultural GenEd and the Social Justice GenEd)
 Plus major requirements with flexible timing to total 30-36 credits for the year

Major Requirements – Typical Second-Year Schedule

Major Requirements – Typical Fourth-Year Schedule

12 to 16 credits of Practicum chosen (in consultation with your EDUC advisor) from:

EDUC 464, Middle School Practicum and Seminar (4-12 cr)

EDUC 465, High School Practicum and Seminar (4-12 cr)

EDUC 468, Elementary (1-6) Practicum and Seminar (4-12 cr)

Plus any outstanding major requirements, GenEds, or electives needed to total a minimum of 120 credits for your career

ARTS Major – Program Standards

Program standards for the ARTS major include, but are not limited to:

- Have earned a 2.500 GPA or higher in all program requirements
- Have earned a cumulative GPA of 2.500 or higher
- Have earned a C or better in all courses with an ARTS or ATPY prefix

EDUC Major – Program Standards

Program standards for the EDUC major include, but are not limited to:

- A minimum cumulative GPA of 2.750 for all designated licensure courses (see *Educator Preparation Handbook* for more information)
- Earn a minimum cumulative GPA of 2.500
- Receive a passing score on the Communication and Literacy Skills Test (reading and writing) of the Massachusetts Test for Education Licensure (MTEL)
- Receive passing scores on the appropriate MTEL Subject Tests
- Earn minimum grades specified for designated course (see the *Educator Preparation Handbook*)
